

He also talked about air raid shelters, Anderson and Morrison, Sittingbourne Paper Mill, grocery coupons and rationing, picking blackberries along the road and the Rainham train crash that happened in Oak Lane, Upchurch in August 1944.

We also learned about Browns the Butchers that used to be in Sittingbourne, and Mr Brown was also the father of one of our ladies here at **Hengist Field** – as a little girl, she can remember all the animals in the field that were destined for the Butcher's shop.

The topics discussed brought back lots of memories for our residents as they reminisced. It was great – lots of questions were asked and answered.
